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The Civil War Sesquicentennial and Family History

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I'm excited about all the events planned throughout the U.S. to mark the 150th anniversary of the Civil War. It makes me want to discuss Civil War ancestors and how to find them. Problem is, the current book project covers five generations with the sixth as children. It is in the seventh generation that we see Civil War participation. I feel frustrated by the "haven't gotten there yet" aspects of this.

The newsletter has certainly covered in past issues the participation of Gideon Welles, the Secretary of the Navy under Abraham Lincoln. From Gideon's own diary, we know what he did during the Civil War and how it affected his family. Can we bring the same sense of immediacy and intimacy that we find in Gideon's diary into our own family research?

What can you do to bring the Civil War into your own genealogy? Certainly understanding what military service your ancestors gave is a start, but other family members also participated in Civil War service. Finally, the Civil War took place here in the U.S. It may have come into your ancestors' personal experience in many different ways, from actual fighting to witnessing related events.
